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

TO THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF TRADE.

SIR,

In pursuance of your instructions, I have the honour to submit the present, being the Second Annual Report on the Labour Department of the Board of Trade, with an Abstract of Labour Statistics, and introduction thereto. It is not necessary in this report to give a detailed account of the functions and methods of working of the Department, which have undergone no material change since the issue of the First Annual Report (for 1893-4) in which they were fully described. During the year 1894-5, to which the present report relates, all the branches of work which were described in the previous report have been continued and developed.

(1.) The monthly publication of the "Labour Gazette" has been continued. No change has been made in the size, or in the general scheme of contents, during the year, but additions have been made from time to time to the sources of information with a view to render the reports on the state of employment more useful and comprehensive. An example of such additions is the series of reports on the state of the steel and iron industries (based at present on monthly returns from over 160 firms employing nearly 60,000 persons in these industries).

The Department received for the purpose of the August "Labour Gazette" 2,539 reports and returns (compared with about 1,500 a year ago), viz., 1,071 from employers or employers' associations, 1,238 from workmen or workmen's associations, and 230 from official and other miscellaneous sources.

The number of firms making regular monthly returns as to the numbers employed has risen from 597 employing 263,785 persons in July 1894, to 864 employing 334,493 persons in July 1895. The industries so covered are coal, iron and shale mining, pig iron manufacture, iron and steel and tin plate works, dock and wharf labour. Agriculture, the textile trades, and seamen, &c., with regard to which about 200 monthly returns are received, are not included in the above.

The number of trade unions making monthly reports of the actual number of unemployed members has risen from 52 with a membership of 358,565 in July 1894, to 86 with a membership of 391,093 in July 1895. This number is exclusive of a very large number of trade unions which, though unable to furnish exact statistics of unemployed, report regularly as to the state of employment for their members, either directly to the central office, or to the various local correspondents of the Department.

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The Department is entirely dependent on information voluntarily supplied, and has no powers of compelling information to be furnished. It is therefore very satisfactory to find that there is an increase of willingness on the part both of employers and workmen and their organisations to furnish such information at regular intervals.

Report (by Miss Collet) on Employment of Women and Girls. Report by Chief Labour Correspondent on Strikes and Lock-outs of 1893.

Report by Chief Labour Correspondent on Trade Unions (1893).

Report (by Mr. Schloss) on "Gain-Sharing," and other systems of Bonus on Production.

Of the above, the Reports on Strikes and Lock-outs, and Trade Unions are annual publications in continuation of the series of similar reports published in previous years. The Reports on Women's Employment and on "Gain-Sharing," are the results of

special inquiries.

The Report on Wages and Hours of Labour partakes of the character both of an annual and special report. The first volume dealing with the changes in wages and hours of labour throughout the year 1893, with preliminary figures for 1894, is intended to be the first of a series of annual reports. The second volume embodies the result of a special inquiry into Piece Lists recognised in various industries, which was necessary at the outset in order to enable the changes in such lists to be adequately and systematically treated in reports on wageschanges. The third volume deals with standard time rates in a similar way. It may probably be found desirable to repeat the issue of at least the third volume at suitable intervals, in order to keep the information up to date.

With regard to the other subjects of special inquiry mentioned in the last report as then in progress, considerable advance has been made during the year in the investigation with regard to irregularity of employment. Some of the preliminary results have been published in the "Labour Gazette" (November 1894, p. 336; June 1895, p. 175), and a considerable amount of information obtained in the course of the inquiry was laid before the Select Committee of the House of Commons on Distress from Want of Employment, in the evidence of Mr. Llewellyn Smith, and will

be found in the Minutes of Evidence.

Some further results (still of a preliminary character) are given in the Abstract which accompanies the present Report, and in the tables on "Fluctuations of Employment" (pp. 71 to 79). It is hoped by publishing preliminary results in this way from time to time, to place the public promptly in possession of the information already obtained by the Department, so far as it throws light on questions in which public interest is felt, without detriment to the thoroughness of the inquiry as a whole, which must necessarily be of a very laborious character. It is hoped also that the publication of partial results from time to time will extend the public interest in the work and add to the sources of information available. Some progress has also been made during the year with the inquiry as to certain matters connected with children's employment, and in the "Labour Gazette" for December 1894, p. 370, some statistics were published with regard to London.

- (3.) As in the previous year the Department has been able to give informal assistance to other Departments of the Government desirous of obtaining information for administrative purposes as to rates of wages and conditions of labour in various industries.
- (4.) The Department has been represented at the following important congresses of workpeople's organisations: The Trade Union Congress at Cardiff; the Co-operative Congress at Huddersfield; the International Co-operative Congress in London; the International Miners' Congress in Paris; the Women's Co-operative Guild.
- (5.) The trade disputes or questions likely to result in such disputes, with regard to which the Department has taken action during the year with a view to conciliation, are as follows:—
- (a.) Sanitary Pressers, Hanley.—Dispute affecting altogether about 300 workpeople, originating in a difference with regard to the price to be paid for a new kind of basin. The dispute began on October 29th, 1894. The attention of the Department having been called to the dispute by its correspondent in the district, an interview took place on February 14th, 1895, between a representative of the Department and the parties concerned, resulting in an application by them to the Board of Trade to appoint an arbitrator to settle the question, the men agreeing to return to work at once pending his decision. The Board of Trade appointed the Right Honourable A. J. Mundella, M.P., who met the parties at the works on March 18th. After hearing the evidence, the arbitrator made suggestions with a view of obtaining a mutual agreement between the disputants, which were ultimately adopted by the parties.
- (b.) DURHAM COAL TRADE.—The representatives of the employers and workmen on the newly formed conciliation board in the Durham coal trade having failed to agree upon an umpire, a joint application, under Rule 4 of the Constitution, was made to the Board of Trade on February 26th, 1895, to

appoint such umpire to determine questions which the Board of Conciliation was unable to settle. On March 19th the Board of Trade appointed the Right Honourable Lord Davey as umpire. Shortly afterwards a proposed reduction of wages was referred to Lord Davey, who, on May 1st, decided that wages should be reduced $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., dating from May 6th and 13th.

- (c.) BOOT AND SHOE TRADE.—A general dispute took place in the boot and shoe trade beginning at the end of March 1895. The causes and progress of the dispute are fully described in the "Labour Guzette," February (p. 48), March (p. 80), April (p. 112), May (p. 142). The dispute affected about 46,000 operatives, and the questions at issue were very complicated. The principal matters in dispute related to the preparation of piecework statements for machine work, the constitution and limitation of powers of trade arbitration boards and the enforcement of their awards, the "minimum" wages of clickers and pressmen, the sending out of work from the towns into the country districts, and the employers' control over the internal management of the factory. After several unsuccessful attempts at mediation by various parties, a letter was addressed, on March 27th, by Sir Courtenay Boyle to the secretaries of the organisations of employers and employed, inviting them to send representatives to a preliminary and informal conference, with the view of discussing the possibility of discovering a method for the settlement of the dispute. The conference was held at the Board of Trade, there being present four representatives of each side, Sir Courtenay Boyle (in the chair), the Commissioner for Labour, and the local correspondent of the Labour, Department in the Leicester district. The conference met on April 4th and 5th, and then, after making some progress towards a settlement, adjourned until April 11th. A second adjournment took place until April 18th, without an agreement being arrived at. On April 18th the conference considered some draft suggestions put forward by the chairman as a new basis for discussion, with the result that on the following day terms of settlement were finally agreed upon and signed by the parties. The full terms are printed in the "Labour Gazette" (May, 1895, p. 143).
- (d.) Interpretation of Terms of Settlement of the Boot and Shoe Dispute.—Under the terms of settlement Sif Courtenay Boyle is umpire, to determine questions of interpretation of the agreement itself.

Under this clause two questions of interpretation have been submitted to Sir Courtenay Boyle, viz., the definition of the term "process" in section 1, and the interpretation of the clause in section 7, dealing with the notices for advance in wages of clickers and pressmen. After an interview with the parties, he gave a decision on both points, which is printed in the "Labour Gazette" for June, p. 179.

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(e.) CARPENTERS AND JOINERS' DISPUTE AT LEICESTER.—A dispute affecting 400 men began on April 1st, arising out of the proposed revision of the local working rules and a demand for a rise of wages. The employers conceded the rise, but declined to give way with regard to piecework and the employment of non-society men. The dispute lasted until the end of May, when a request, dated May 30th, was addressed by both parties to the Board of Trade to nominate a "mediator" to preside at a joint conference, to endeavour to put an end to the dispute. The Board of Trade nominated Sir William Markby, K.C.I.E., who presided at a meeting on Thursday, June 6th, at the Town Hall, Leicester, when a satisfactory arrangement was arrived at, the full terms being printed in the "Labour" Gazette for June, p. 179.

INTRODUCTION TO ABSTRACT OF LABOUR STATISTICS.

TO THE CONTROLLER-GENERAL OF THE COMMERCIAL, LABOUR, AND STATISTICAL DEPARTMENTS OF THE BOARD OF TRADE.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to present the accompanying Tables relating to various branches of Labour Statistics which have been prepared, in accordance with your directions, by the Labour Department of the Board of Trade.

Many of the tables included in the present volume are similar in form to those which appeared in the "Abstract" for the previous year though brought up to date wherever possible. It is only necessary here to notice briefly the principal changes and additions that have been made.

Federations of Trade Unions.—The section dealing with trade unions has been enlarged by the addition of a table relating to Federations (pages 21-4) with regard to which no statistics have hitherto been collected or published. It should be explained that for the purpose of these tables a "Federation" is regarded as an association of separate trade societies or branches of societies connected with kindred trades, for certain limited and specific purposes, with limited and defined powers over its constituent societies. It is thus distinguished from a trade union by the fact that its constituent members are societies or branches and not individuals; and from a trade council or congress, by the possession of certain powers of direction over its affiliated societies beyond merely consultative functions. It is, however, not always easy in practice to maintain these distinctions rigidly, there being some organisations which partake to some extent of the character of a union and to some extent of a federation. The tables on pages 21-4 include particulars with regard to 75 federations to which are affiliated 753 unions or branches of unions, with an aggregate membership of 878,414. More than half of the total membership, however, is accounted for by three of the principal federations. No fewer than 33 of the federations included in the table are connected with building trades.

Employers' Associations.—Another new table relating to industrial organisations is that on page 28, which enumerates the Associations of employers so far as known to the Department. These Associations are for the most part unregistered, and many of them publish no particulars with regard to

membership or funds. It has, therefore, only been possible in the present report to classify the associations according to groups of trades, distinguishing federations, national and local associations. It should be observed that many of these associations exist mainly for trade purposes and do not deal with questions of wages. Altogether 658 associations of employers are included in the table. Of these, however, 171 are trade protection societies, 95 chambers of commerce, and 67 chambers of agriculture and farmers' clubs. Of the remaining 325 associations, 98 are connected with the building trades, 50 with the metal, engineering and shipbuilding trades, 53 with the clothing trades, 32 with the textile industries, 29 with mining and quarrying, and the remainder with various other groups of trades.

Co-operation.—Most of the tables relating to Co-operation are similar in form to those which appeared last year, but after giving the most careful attention to the matter it has been found impracticable to maintain the distinction formerly attempted between "associations of consumers" and "associations of producers." Although this principle of classification is in some respects more scientific than the usual distinction between "distributive" and "productive" societies, the constitution of many societies established for production was found on enquiry to be of such a character that it was impossible to classify them under either of the two heads. The terms adopted in the present report are "Associations for Distribution" and "Associations for Production," the societies being classified according to the main purposes for which they were established. The only new tables relating to co-operation are those on pages 34 and 35 in which, for the first time, statistics are presented, showing the extent and character of the production carried on by co-operative societies established primarily for distributive In these societies the production of some of the articles required by their members is conveniently carried on as a part of the ordinary business of the societies. The figures for 1894 show that the 313 societies making returns employed 4,581 workers in production, and that the value of the production amounted to 1,514,529l. of which total 1,118,939l. represented the value of the goods produced in corn mills and bakeries. Thus as regards the value of their productions (though not the number of persons employed) these societies take the first place among the various classes of societies engaged in co-operative production.

Trade Disputes.—The section of the report dealing with trade disputes has been somewhat developed. All the tables now given show the number of persons affected as well as the number of disputes. A new table appears on page 66 classifying the trade disputes of 1894 according to the months in which they took place. From this it will be seen that the summer months were the most prolific in disputes, the six months, April to September

inclusive, accounting for disputes affecting 238,046 persons, compared with only 70,304 involved in the disputes in the six winter months.

"Conciliation and Arbitration.—The tables dealing with conciliation and arbitration are partly new. The work of trade boards and district boards (i.e., boards connected with particular trades and boards representing employers and employed in particular districts), are separately dealt with in the tables on pages 68 and 69, while particulars of the settlement of actual trade disputes by conciliation and arbitration are given in the table on page 70. It will be seen that the subject matter of these tables is by no means identical. On the one hand the work of established boards of conciliation and arbitration is very largely concerned with cases and questions which have not actually led to strikes or lock-outs. Trade boards in particular are almost exclusively concerned with the settlement of difficulties which otherwise might have led to a cessation of work, and not with the settlement of actual trade disputes. Hence the table dealing with the settlement of trade disputes by conciliation and arbitration only includes a small fraction of the cases included in the other two tables. On the other hand, it includes all disputes settled by such methods, whether by boards, individuals, or other agencies. Both in 1893 and 1894, important disputes were brought to an end by the friendly mediation or arbitration of individuals.

Fluctuations in Employment.—The section entitled "Fluctuations in Employment," is almost entirely new. The tables and charts on pages 71–5 bring together figures based upon the monthly returns of trade unions connected with various trades showing the proportion of unemployed members.

In the first of these tables the percentage of unemployed for all unions making returns is given for each month in the years 1887 to 1894 inclusive. The table on page 72 gives the mean percentage, both for all trades making returns and for certain important groups of trades separately, for each month of the year (the mean being taken for the seven years 1888 to 1894). The object of taking the mean in this way is to eliminate the effect of changes of employment from year to year, and to show the effect of seasonal changes only. The charts given on the opposite page are based upon these figures, and show the seasonal character of such trades as building and printing. In the second chart (B.) the range is taken from February to February, in order to bring out more clearly the character of the seasonal oscillation of the building trades.

The table and chart on the two following pages are also based upon the figures given on page 71, but these figures are here grouped so as to show the changes of employment from year to year only, and to exclude the effect of seasonal changes. The percentages of unemployed given for each of the years 1887

to 1894, are the mean of the percentages given for each month of those years. The charts which appear opposite the table on page 74 show the "cyclical" fluctuation in employment during this period of years. Chart B. shows the violence of these fluctuations in the engineering and shipbuilding group of trades.

The two following tables dealing with irregularity of employment in the engineering trade embody the results of new investigations now being carried out by the Department, with a view to throw light on the effect of irregularity of employment on the actual work and earnings of the individual workmen in certain trades. The industry hitherto dealt with is the engineering trade. The tables on pages 76 and 77 give the result of an elaborate analysis of the "vacant" books of an important engineering union in the Manchester and Leeds districts. The work of analysis, which is very laborious, has, as yet, only been completed up to the end of 1890, but is still being continued. The membership of the union in the selected districts is about 6,000, and the "vacant books," in which unemployed members sign their names day by day, afford a record of the employment of these individuals. The tables show that, on the mean of the four years, 70 per cent. of the working members did not sign the book as "unemployed" at all during the year, that 23.8 per cent. lost under 12 weeks in the year, 3.4 per cent. from 12 to 24 weeks, and the remaining 2.8 per cent. over 24 weeks. Percentages of members unemployed at some time during the year varied from 42.2 in 1887 to 19.8 in 1889, while the average proportion unemployed at any given time varied from 8.1 per cent. in 1887 to 2.1 per cent. in 1890. The number of working days in the year lost, per member, through want of employment varied from 24.7 in 1887 to 6.5 in 1889 and 1890.

The tables on pages 78 and 79 dealing with the number of days worked in coal mines, and the number of dock labourers employed by the dock companies of London, bring together in a convenient form statistics already published month by month in the "Labour Gazette."

Wages and Hours of Labour.—The section relating to wages and hours of labour has been very considerably altered. The tables on pages 90-5 with regard to recent changes in rates of wages and hours of labour summarise in a convenient form some of the principal results given in the report on changes in wages and hours of labour in the United Kingdom, recently published by the Department.

The tables on the following six pages state for certain important towns the rates of wages and hours of labour recognised by the members of the chief trade unions connected with certain important trades. It should be understood that the tables merely profess to give the rates recognised by certain unions. It is not thereby implied that all these rates are universally current in the districts concerned.

The tables which follow on pages 102-27, with regard to average rates of wages, are based upon the results of the Board of Trade Census of Wages, which was begun in 1886. Some of the tables which are included in the present Volume have already appeared in the last number of the Abstract. Others, however (see pages 104-7 and 116-27) are new, being compiled from the "General Report on the Wages of the Manual Labour" Classes in the United Kingdom," recently issued by the Board of Trade. Tables of rates of wages of women and girls, and half-timers, based on the 1886 census, have also been given (see pages 128 and 129) from the report by the Labour Department on the employment of women and girls referred to below.

Industrial Accidents.—The chief changes in the section dealing with industrial accidents are the inclusion of statistics with regard to railway servants killed or injured by accidents not concerned with the movement of railway vehicles, and with regard to accidents to persons employed in the construction or working of docks, bridges, and other works included within the scope of the Notice of Accidents Act, 1894. A table has also been given on page 133 summarising the industrial accidents reported from all sources.

Conjugal Condition of Women Textile Workers.—A new section, compiled from the report by Miss Collet on the Statistics of Employment of Women and Girls, recently published by the Department, is given on pages 176 to 179. The tables give particulars with regard to the women and girls employed in the cotton, woollen, and worsted trades, distinguishing girls from women, and classifying women as unmarried, married, or widowed.

The remaining tables in the Abstract do not call for any special comment.








