



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Family Expenditure Survey. Report for 1960 and 1961

Introduction

1. In an Interim Report published in August 1951* the Cost of Living Advisory Committee recommended that an enquiry into the pattern of expenditure by private households should be held as soon as possible and that there should be smaller-scale enquiries at frequent intervals thereafter. The large-scale Household Expenditure Enquiry took place in 1953 - 54† and the small-scale continuing Family Expenditure Survey began in 1957. In 1962 the Committee recommended the use of information obtained from the Family Expenditure Survey over a period of three consecutive years as a basis for annual revision of the weighting pattern of the official Index of Retail Prices.‡

2. A Report on the Surveys for 1957 - 59, published in 1961,§ described the main features of the survey and included many of the principal results. Some results for the 1960 and the 1961 Surveys were published in the December 1961 and the June 1962 issues respectively of the Ministry of Labour Gazette. The present Report provides further results for 1960 and 1961 comparable with most of those published for the Surveys of 1957 - 59. As in earlier years, the Ministry of Labour was the Department responsible for carrying out the Surveys for 1960 and 1961, but the selection of the sample, the interviewing of households and the coding of the records were carried out by the Social Survey Division of the Central Office of Information. The detailed plans for the Surveys were considered by an inter-departmental committee under the chairmanship of the Director of the Central Statistical Office, and close liaison was maintained between the Ministry of Labour, the Central Statistical Office and the Social Survey in the day to day running of the Surveys.

Description of the Survey

3. In general, the objects and main characteristics of the Surveys for 1960 and 1961, the selection of the sample, the definition of households, and the arrangements for seeking their co-operation, were similar to those for 1959. Thus in both 1960 and 1961, a sample of about 5,000 addresses in the United Kingdom was selected, and these were visited in rotation throughout the year. The households at these addresses were asked to co-operate in maintaining detailed expenditure records for 14 consecutive days, in providing interviewers with information covering longer periods for certain payments which recur fairly regularly (e.g., rent, gas and electricity, insurance, licences, etc.) and about incomes. Nearly three-quarters of the households approached co-operated in the Survey in each year. The more important changes since 1959 are mentioned in the following paragraphs.

Schedules used in the Survey

4. The schedules and diary record-books used in 1960 were similar to those used in 1959 but the forms used in 1961 were revised in layout to embody improvements suggested by experience and to facilitate processing of the

information by an electronic computer. The main changes in the schedules used in 1961 as compared with those used in 1959 are set out below.

Household Schedule

5. In 1961 additional information was obtained on this Schedule (form SS 811A) || about the marital status of members of the household, and the source of housing loans and mortgages on which repayments were being made. Questions about payments under hire purchase or credit sales agreements, about the industry, occupation and employment status of workers, were transferred from the Household Schedule to the Personal Schedules. The question about ownership of a car, refrigerator, etc. was omitted, and types of full-time education were distinguished under slightly different categories.

Personal Schedules

6. Two Personal Schedules were provided in 1961 whereas one only had been used in earlier years.¶ The Personal Income Schedule (SS 811B) covered the same income information as in 1959 except that, for employees, the questions were designed to provide information about the normal wage or salary instead of the wage or salary last received. Questions about the employment status of spenders were also included in the Personal Income Schedule in 1961. The second Schedule —the Personal Expenditure Schedule (SS 811C) contained questions about expenditure on items normally occurring at relatively long but usually regular intervals similar to those included in the Personal Schedule for 1959. In addition, questions about hire purchase or credit sales agreements which were included in the Household Schedule up to 1960, were transferred to the Personal Expenditure Schedule in 1961. Details of amounts allowed in part exchange and the periods and amounts of credit involved in hire purchase transactions were coded in 1961 for the first time.

Diary record-books

7. The diary record-books (SS 811D) and the instructions for their completion in 1961 were similar to those in earlier years.**

Examination and processing of information

- 8. In 1960 and 1961 the procedure for examining completed household records and for identifying different types of expenditure or income by numeral codes was similar to that adopted in 1957 - 59. From 1961 onwards, the interview schedules included codes denoting the periods (ranging from one week to one year) covered by the expenditure or income recorded on these schedules. These "period" codes were used by the electronic computer to convert the expenditure and income recorded for varying periods to a common period of one week. The computer assembled more complex pieces of information from the component items (e.g., gross household income and household types) and allotted codes to them. In 1959 provision was made to record separately hire purchase payments on a limited range of items only, whereas from 1960 all hire purchase payments were separated from cash payments; and in 1961 purchases through "clubs" were also segregated. A list of the basic expenditure item codes used in 1961, also showing the items on which hire purchase payments were made and on which goods were acquired through a commodity club, is given in Appendix II (page 60). This Appendix shows the maximum detail in which the expenditures in the tables for 1961 can be analysed, and is comparable with Appendix IVA (page 70) to the 1957 - 59 Report which provides expenditure groupings for 1959. The sources of the income distinguished were similar to those included in 1959 except that National Insurance maternity allowances and death and funeral grants were omitted from income in 1961.
- 9. Most of the sorting codes used for grouping households in 1960 and 1961 are similar to those used in 1959 (see 1957 - 59 Report, Appendix V). From 1960 onwards, however, a further Household Composition category was provided to sub-divide the miscellaneous group "All other Households" between those with and those without children. In addition, the classification of heads of households by the industry in which they were employed was based on the revised (1958) Standard Industrial Classification and this differed from the classification used up to 1959.* Details of the 29 groups used in 1960 and 1961 are contained in Appendix III (page 69). Analyses of certain characteristics of respondent households can be provided for 1961 for each group of households which can be separately classified, on similar lines to the analysis of "Persons in the Household "as shown in Appendix IV C (page 79) to the Report for 1957 - 59.
- 10. The records from the 1960 Survey were processed by the Statistics Department of the Ministry of Labour by the conventional punched card methods used for processing the material from the 1957 59 Surveys.† The results derived from the 1961 Survey were processed on an Emidec electronic computer which is also being used from 1961 to produce tabulations required by the Central Statistical Office.

Proportions of households co-operating

11. The co-operating households represented 71 per cent. of the effective sample in 1960 and 72 per cent. of the effective sample in 1961 as compared with nearly

67 per cent. in 1959. Analyses of the characteristics of and persons in co-operating households in 1960 and 1961 are given in Appendices IA and IB (pages 58 and 59). These include additional categories for "Three Adults" and "Four Adults" under Household Composition, and "Shop Assistants" under Occupation of Head of Household. The figures are generally comparable with those shown in Appendix II (pages 53 - 54) to the Report for 1957 - 59 except for changes in income ranges and definitions (see para. 13 below). The numbers of households actually recording expenditure on different commodities or services, expressed as a percentage of all households in the 1961 Survey are included in Appendix IV (page 70).

Description of expenditure tables

- 12. The information about the average size and composition of the households in each group is presented on the same lines as in the 1957 59 Report. All expenditures are recorded on similar lines to 1957 59. The treatment of housing costs of owner-occupiers, payments into clothing clubs, purchases of second-hand goods, and income tax deductions is also similar. In 1961 an additional item group 64A has been provided for "Household appliances other than gas or electric appliances", which were included in group 66 "China, glass, cutlery, hardware, ironmongery, etc." in 1957 60. The figures in group 66 for 1961 are not therefore comparable with those for group 66 for earlier years.
- 13. The tables which follow analyse expenditure in various ways. They are presented in a form generally comparable with that used in the Report for 1957 - 59. Table 1 (page 6) shows, for all co-operating households, average weekly expenditure for 1960 and 1961; and for the three-year periods 1957 - 59, 1958 - 60 and 1959 - 61. The figures shown for each of the three-year periods are unweighted averages of the yearly averages. Tables 2 and 3 (pages 10 to 25) analyse the expenditure of co-operating households by gross income of household, distinguishing nine income ranges in 1960 and 1961 respectively. In 1960 the ranges were the same as those used in Table 4 of the 1957 - 59 Report. In 1961 the income ranges were modified with the object of providing more detailed information for some of the income groups with large numbers of households, and to avoid giving data for comparatively small groups of households. Although (apart from the difference in ranges in 1961) Tables 2 and 3 are in the same form as Table 4 of the Report for 1957 - 59, the analysis by income ranges is not exactly comparable because in 1960 and 1961 household income was calculated by using the normal wage or salary, rather than the actual wage or salary of each member of the household for the week or month preceding the interview. The last wage or salary paid may be higher or lower than usual. This change has considerably reduced the numbers of groups of households showing expenditures in excess of incomes. In 1959, when actual incomes were taken, such instances were numerous since some households whose members were temporarily unemployed or sick, showed higher expenditure patterns

which related to their higher normal incomes instead of to their temporarily reduced circumstances. Tables 3 - 11 (pages 18 to 57) all relate to 1961. Table 3 (page 18) and Tables 6 - 11 (pages 34 to 57) provide the only analyses by gross income of household available for 1961. Table 4 (page 26) analyses expenditure by the four quarters of 1961 and is comparable with Table 5 of the Report for 1957 - 59. Table 5 (page 30) analyses the expenditure of co-operating households by the same four types of areas as were distinguished in Tables 6 - 9 of the earlier Report, but does not provide a further analysis by household incomes. Tables 6 - 11 (pages 34 to 57) provide expenditure analysed by six main types of household composition, namely, one adult; one man and one woman; one man, one woman and one child; one man, one woman and two children; one man, one woman and three or more children; and three adults respectively. Children are defined as under the age of 16. Detailed information is shown for each type of household sub-divided by broad ranges of income. The results are not strictly comparable with those shown in Table 10 (page 48) of the 1957 - 59 Report* because the definitions of household type and housing costs in that table were those used by the Central Statistical Office whereas Ministry of Labour definitions are used in the present Report. Additional tables showing expenditures in 1960 and 1961 classified by types of households similar to those shown in Table 3 (page 16) of the Report for 1957 - 59 have been published in the Ministry of Labour Gazette.†

Reliability of the Survey results: sampling errors

14. Some indications of the reliability of the Survey results and how this inevitably varies between different headings of expenditure are given by the percentage standard errors of the average weekly expenditures under the various headings of all households co-operating

The method of calculation of these standard errors is an approximate one, in that the co-operating households have been regarded as a representative sample, obtained by single-stage random selection, of all private households in the United Kingdom. The two-stage sampling design, the stratification used in selecting households and the variations in the extent to which selected households in different groups co-operated have thus not been taken into account.

The method of calculation was as follows:-

where e represents the weekly expenditure of each individual household on the item or group of items e represents the mean weekly expenditure of all house-

n represents the number of households and ≥ denotes summation over all households.

This percentage standard error of ē is the standard error of ē expressed as a percentage of ē. If this is 5.0 per cent. or above for an individual item group, it is given to the nearest integer. As it cannot be assumed that this method of calculation would be satisfactory for sub-groups of households, reliable estimates of the standard errors of the average weekly expenditures of sub-groups of households cannot be obtained directly from those relating to all co-operating households simply by adjustment for the numbers of households in the sub-groups.

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General Notes to Expenditure Tables

- 1. Fuller details of the commodities and services listed in column 2 of the tables will be found in the Item Code reproduced in Appendix II (page 60).
- 2. Expenditure on repairs to housing, furniture, appliances and other durable household goods and to vehicles has been included in the appropriate groups covering other expenditure on housing, durable household goods and vehicles, respectively. On the other hand, expenditure on repairs to clothing, footwear and other personal goods has been included under "Services".
- 3. In the tables, expenditure on the purchase or structural alterations of dwellings, including deposits and mortgage repayments, has been included at the end of each table under "Other Payments Recorded". The figures for the "Housing" group and those near the end of each table described as "Grand Total, All Above Expenditure" include, in addition to specific payments, the weekly equivalent of the net rateable value of dwellings owned by their occupiers.
- 4. Purchases, including hire purchase, of gas and electric appliances have been included in the group covering durable household goods, but charges for the rental of gas and electric appliances have been included in the group covering fuel, light and power. No account has been taken of the rebates received in respect of certain slot meter payments for gas and electricity.
- 5. The recorded expenditures on alcoholic drink and tobacco and (but to a much lesser extent) on meals bought away from home, sweets, chocolates and ice cream are known to be understated.
- 6. Both individual and total expenditure figures have been independently rounded to one decimal place of a penny. The sums of the constituent items do not, therefore, necessarily agree exactly with the totals shown.
 - 7. "Nil" expenditure and expenditure of less than 0.05d. are both shown as "__".
 - 8. The average number of persons per household has been rounded to two decimal places.
- 9. Instances where average weekly expenditures of 2s. 0.0d. or more are known to have a relatively high sampling error, are indicated by footnotes to the tables.

10. Item group reference 102 "Betting, payments less winnings" is included in Tables 2 and 3 only.






