CUSTOMS.

Cinematograph Films.—It is proposed to place British Empire films on the same basis as films produced abroad by British residents in this country. As from 28th April, 1928, British Empire negative films will be admitted at the rate of duty applicable to blank film, provided they comply with the definition of a British film given in the Cinematograph Films Act, 1927.

II.—NEW DUTIES.

CUSTOMS.

Mechanical Lighters.—It is proposed to levy a duty of 6d. each on imports of mechanical lighters and of component parts (other than flints) as from 28th April, 1928.

Buttons.—It is proposed to levy a duty on imports as from 28th April, 1928, for a period of five years at the rate of 331 per cent. ad valorem, with a preferential rebate of one-third in favour of Empire goods.

Hydrocarbon oils.—It is proposed to levy a duty of 4d. per gallon on imports as from 25th April, 1928. A rebate will be provided in respect of the heavy oils, thus leaving the tax in effect payable only in respect of the light oils such as petrol, benzol, kerosene, white spirit, and turpentine.

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EXCISE. Mechanical Lighters.—It is proposed to impose a duty of 6d. each on mechanical lighters manufactured on and after the 28th April, 1928.

The material and a superior of the sale of Petroleum Oils.—It is proposed to levy an Excise Duty of 4d. per gallon on stocks of petroleum oils where such stocks on the 25th April, 1928, exceed 10,000 gallons in the case of any one owner, but in the case of stocks for the owner's use no tax will be leviable if the stocks are used before 1st May. A rebate on the heavy oils will be provided, as in the case of the Customs duty.

It is proposed that these changes shall take effect from 1st January 1929. The rates for electrically propelled goods vehicles will remain unaltered.

The classes of agricultural and showmen's goods-carrying vehicles for which special rates were fixed in the Fourth Schedule to the Finance Act, 1927, will be liable to the appropriate rate as set out in that schedule or to the appropriate rate set out in column 3 above, whichever may be the less.

The rebate of 20 per cent. for vehicles over two tons in weight unladen, fitted entirely with pneumatic tyres, will apply to all vehicles of the goods-carrying class.

C.—INLAND REVENUE.

Income Tax.

It is proposed to alter the law relating to relief in respect of children and to increase the amount of the relief from the tax on £36 for the first child and £27 for each subsequent child, to the tax on £60 for the first child and £50 for each subsequent child. The increased relief will be allowed for the year of birth of the child.
