## INLAND REVENUE.

## Income, Tax.

It is proposed to increase the allowance in respect of a wife's earned income from a maximum of $£ 45$ to a maximum of $£ 80$.

It is proposed to extend to employees assessed yearly the allowance in respect of additional travelling expenses incurred through change of place of work or residence due to the war now granted to manual wage-earners assessed half-yearly.

It is proposed to make the profits of farming chargeable under Schedule D instead of Schedule B in cases where the annual value of the lands exceeds $£ 100$, and in cases where the annual value is less than $£ 100$ to charge tax under Schedule B on three times the annual value instead of on the single annual value.

It is proposed to abolish the allowance of discount on the pre-payment of tax assessed under Schedule D.

Purchase Tax.- It is proposed that the tax now payable on chargeable purchases of the following goods shall be raised from its present rate of $33 \frac{1}{3}$ per cent. of their wholesale value to $66 \frac{2}{3}$ per cent., the increase to take effect from the 15 th April, 1942.

Chargeable Goods in respect of which the Tax is to be raised to $66 \frac{2}{3}$ per Cent.
Garments or footwear made wholly or partly of fur skin (including any skin with fur, hair or wool attached) or silk (except silk used for the stitching of seams and buttonholes).

Walking sticks and canes.

Glass mirrors (whether framed or not), not being optically worked or specially designed for use in connection with machinery, tools or instruments.

Trunks, bags, wallets, jewel cases, pouches, purses, suitcases and similar receptacles of a kind used for personal or domestic purposes (whether fitted or not), being articles made of leather, hide or skin, but not including articles designed for use solely as equipment for service in the armed forces or in a civil defence force.
Photographic cameras.

Projectors for sub-standard film or for slides.

Pictures, prints, engravings, photographs, figures, busts, reliefs, vases, and similar articles, if produced in quantity for general sale.

Stationery.-It is proposed to levy the Purchase Tax at the rate of $33 \frac{1}{3}$ per cent., as from the 15th April, 1942, on chargeable purchases of account books and plain books (whether ruled or not), such goods being hitherto exempt.
" Utility" cloth and clothing, and boots and shoes.-It is proposed to exempt from the Purchase Tax, by Treasury Order, " Utility" cloth and clothing, as from a date early in September 1942, and " Utility " boots and shoes as from a later date.
