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The Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the government agency responsible for compiling, analysing and disseminating many of the United Kingdom's economic, social and demographic statistics, including the retail prices index, trade figures and labour market data, as well as the periodic census of the population and health statistics. The Director of ONS is also the National Statistician and the Registrar General for England and Wales, and the agency that administers the statutory registration of births, marriages and deaths there.

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INTRODUCTION

This publication has been prepared by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) in collaboration with a number of government departments and other organisations. The assistance provided by them is gratefully acknowledged.

The name of the department or organisation providing the statistics is shown under each table, additionally, on some tables this is followed by a contact telephone number.

All the data series published in the *Monthly Digest* are contained on an ONS database, and nearly all are stored with a four letter identification code (e.g. ABMZ). These codes appear at the start of columns or rows so that they can be quoted if you contact us requiring any further information.

Britain Update (previously the *Whitehall Brief*) is included at the start of the *Monthly Digest*. It brings together economic and social statistics from Government Statistical Service (GSS) releases in the previous month. It also provides a diary of GSS releases for the current month.

The latest *Annual Supplement* to *Monthly Digest* was published in edition No 661. This gives detailed definitions and explanatory notes. It also provides an index of sources and a breakdown of the regional classifications.

Definitions and classifications

The following general definitions should be noted in using the *Digest*:

Area covered. Except where otherwise stated, all statistics relate to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Seasonality. Except where otherwise stated, all statistics are not adjusted to take account of seasonal factors.

The UK Standard Industrial Classification 1992 is used in a number of tables in this digest to split economic activity. Full details are available from *UK Standard Industrial Classification of Economic Activities 1992*, and *Indexes to the UK Standard Industrial Classification of Economic Activities 1992*, both published by The Stationery Office.

Regional classification is based on the Government Office Regions. This has changed from the Standard Statistical Regions.

Symbols and conventions used

Change of basis. Where consecutive figures have been compiled on different bases and are not strictly comparable, a footnote is added indicating the nature of the difference. Also, a line may be drawn across a column between two consecutive figures indicating that the figures above and below the line have been compiled on different bases.

Units of measurement. The various units of measurement used in this digest are listed on the page opposite the inside back cover.

Symbols. The following symbols have been used throughout:

- .. = not available (also information suppressed to avoid disclosure)
- = nil or less than half the final digit shown
- † = indicates that the data have been revised since the last edition: the period marked is the earliest in the table to have been revised

Also, some tables have symbols specific to them. These will be explained in the footnotes to those tables.

Rounding of figures. In tables where figures have been rounded to the nearest final digit, there may be a slight discrepancy between the sum of the constituent items and the total as shown.

Provisional data

Some figures are provisional and may be subject to revision in later editions. This applies particularly to data for the most recent time periods. Where data has been revised a dagger symbol, as previously mentioned, will appear.

Introduction

ONS On-line services

The data in this publication can be obtained in electronic format via ONS On-line Services. There are a range of different services available.

StatBase® is a web-based service which gives users access to two linked information systems. One system, called **StatSearch**, provides a wealth of information (called 'metadata') about all of the Government Statistical Service's (GSS's) statistical resources, i.e. all its censuses, surveys, publications, periodicals, enquiry services, etc. The other system called **StatStore** contains a wide range of GSS data. The StatBase® site also provides a gateway to the **TimeZone** service.

TimeZone allows users to obtain the full histories of more than 25,000 mainly economic time-series, on a 'per-series' basis. The Retail Price Index is perhaps the most heavily used of these series.

DataBank is an electronic subscription service used mainly by on-sellers and re-sellers. It provides 'bulk' delivery of the complete time-series contents of each of ONS's major economic and socio-economic publications.

BRITAIN UPDATE

Economic overview

As concerns about the world economy continue, UK GDP data have been fairly subdued throughout 2001, with significant effects across a number of indicators from the global slump in ICT industries. This slump and weakening in other industries as well has led to a "recession" in the manufacturing sector dominating the slower growth. On the other hand service sector growth has remained robust in 2001, with only modest signs of weakening in quarter three. Household and business demand is diverging. Household demand grew robustly in the second quarter and indicators look strong into the third, although confidence has fallen. In contrast investment data shows that business demand has weakened in 2001. This comes against a background of falling measured profits and concerns about the indebtedness of the sector. Trade is deteriorating at a fast rate, with both exports and imports declining sharply in the second quarter and monthly data showing continuing falls. Labour market figures now show some deterioration, with Labour Force Survey data showing the employment rate falling and ILO unemployment rate rising. Prices figures show inflation low. Earnings inflation slowed into the latest months and consumer price inflation fell back below the target. Producer prices show falling prices at the factory gate.

Headlines

- Retail prices index (all items) – rose by 1.7 per cent in the 12 months to September, down from 2.1 per cent in August.
- Retail sales (three months to September) – seasonally adjusted volume of sales was 1.5 per cent higher than in the previous three months.
- Gross domestic product (at constant market prices) – third quarter preliminary estimate showed a rise of 0.6 per cent compared with the previous quarter.
- UK trade – UK's balance on trade in goods and services in August was provisionally estimated as a record deficit of £2.4 billion.

Social overview

A major source of information on crime in England and Wales, the British Crime Survey (BCS), has moved to an annual cycle. On the BCS measure, first results suggest that crime fell by a third between 1995 and 2000, with the largest ever annual decrease occurring between 1999 and 2000. The overall victimisation rate is also at its lowest since the survey's inception in 1981. Police recorded crime figures fell by 11.7 per cent in the five year period up to March 2001. The greater decline in BCS crime compared with police recorded crime can be largely explained by increases in police recording of crimes reported to them.

Possible reasons for these downward trends in crime include increased levels of home and vehicle security, local policing and crime reduction initiatives. The picture of declining property crime since the mid-1990s is reflected in many other countries.


Among this month's findings:

- There was a 12 per cent fall in crimes against people living in private households between 1999 and 2000, the third successive fall recorded by the BCS.
- The majority of crimes (55 per cent of the comparable crimes) are not reported to the police.
- Between 1999 and 2000 the total number of domestic burglaries fell 17 per cent.
- The number of violent crimes fell by 19 per cent between 1999 and 2000, with a fall of 34 per cent in woundings.
- Between 2000 and 2001, the proportion who were 'very worried' about rape, physical attack, theft of a car, burglary, theft from a car and mugging fell.

Economic Update

Prices

In the 12 months to September, the all items retail price index (RPI) rose by 1.7 per cent, down from 2.1 per cent in August. Over the same period, the all items excluding mortgage interest payments index (RPIX) rose by 2.3 per cent, down from 2.6 per cent in August.



The largest downward effect on the all items 12 month rate came from changes in motoring costs. This was mainly due to changes in petrol and oil prices, which fell this September compared to increases a year ago, when crude oil prices were at a ten year high. Another large downward effect was due to changes in housing costs, principally due to the mortgage interest payments component, as interest rates fell in September, following a base cut by the Bank of England on 2 August.

The output price index for home sales of manufactured products fell by 0.2 per cent in the 12 months to September, compared with a rise of 0.2 per cent in the 12 months to August.

The input price index for materials and fuel purchased by manufacturing industry fell by 0.3 per cent between August and September.

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Producer prices:


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Retail sales

In September the seasonally adjusted estimate of retail sales volume was 129.1. This was 0.2 per cent above the August figure of 128.8 and 5.9 per cent higher than the September 2000 level. In July to September the volume of sales was 1.5 per cent higher than in the previous three months and 6.2 per cent higher than in the same period a year earlier.

Based on non-seasonally adjusted data, the average weekly value of retail sales in September was £4,060 million, 7.2 per cent higher than in September 2000.

Public sector finances

Provisional estimates of the public finances show that in September:

- The public sector surplus on current budget was £0.1 billion
- Public sector net borrowing was £0.7 billion
- At the end of September public sector net debt outstanding was £307.9 billion, equivalent to 31.1 per cent of gross domestic product.

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Index of production

In August, the seasonally adjusted index for the output of the production industries was 104.7 at 1995 prices. Production industries' output in the latest three months fell by 0.6 per cent compared with the previous three months.


In the same period there was a decrease of 0.9 per cent in manufacturing output, while output of the electricity, gas and water supply industries fell by 0.4 per cent, and mining and quarrying output (including oil and gas extraction) rose by 2.3 per cent, compared with the previous three months.

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Gross domestic product

The preliminary estimate of change in the economy, as measured through gross domestic product (GDP) at constant market prices, shows a rise of 0.6 per cent in the third quarter of 2001 compared with the previous quarter.



The corresponding estimate of change for this quarter over the third quarter of 2000 is an increase in GDP of 2.2 per cent.



UK trade

The UK's balance on trade in goods and services in August was provisionally estimated as a record deficit of £2.4 billion. This compares with the £1.3 billion deficit in July.

Balance of trade



In the three months ended August the balance on trade in goods and services was a record £5.8 billion in deficit. This compares with the £5.1 billion deficit in the previous three months.

The latest estimate of trend (based on data to August) suggests that the UK trade deficit is widening.

The UK's trade deficit on trade in goods in August was provisionally estimated at £3.3 billion. This compares with the £2.5 billion deficit in July. The deficit with EU countries in August was £0.4 billion compared with a surplus of less than £0.1 billion in July. The deficit with non-EU countries in August was £3.0 billion compared with a deficit of £2.5 billion in July.

Trade in goods exports to all the G7 group of countries except France fell, with the largest falls in exports to Germany, Canada, and USA. Among our other major trading partners exports to Norway and Switzerland fell while exports to Irish Republic rose.

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Trade in services:
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Labour market

Both the working age employment rate and the number of people in employment has fallen. Based on the ILO definition, both the unemployment rate and the number of unemployed people went up. But the number of people claiming unemployment-related benefits was lower. The whole economy headline average earnings growth rate has fallen.


Employment

- The working age employment rate was 74.6 per cent in June to August 2001, down 0.3 percentage points from March to May 2001 and down by 0.1 percentage point from a year earlier.
- The employment level was 28.16 million in June to August 2001, down 19,000 from March to May 2001 but up 181,000 on a year earlier.



Unemployment

- The ILO unemployment rate was 5.1 per cent in June to August 2001, up 0.2 percentage points from March to May 2001 but down 0.2 percentage points from a year earlier.



- The claimant count level in September 2001 was 942,100, down 4,900 on the month and down 101,200 on a year earlier.

Earnings

- Whole economy headline (three month average) GB average earnings increased by 4.5 per cent in the year to August 2001, down 0.1 percentage point from the July rate.

Foreign labour in the United Kingdom

Labour Market Trends published an article containing information on recent trends in international labour migration into the UK and its effects on the labour market. Key points included:

- The inflow of foreign workers has been rising throughout the 1990s.
- In 2000 there were around 1.1 million foreign national workers (and around twice as many foreign-born workers), the number having grown by more than a fifth since 1992.
- Two-thirds of all foreign workers are in the South East with nearly half in London.

Health and safety

The Health and Safety Executive (HSE) has published *Health and Safety Statistics for 2000/01*. Key findings include:

- Estimated final figures for reported fatal injuries to workers in 2000/01 is expected to be 295, a rise of 34 per cent on the previous year.
- For 2000/01 there are expected to be 215 fatal injuries to employees, the highest number since 1993/94.

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Crime

First results of the 2001 British Crime Survey (BCS) for England and Wales have been published by the Home Office (HO). The main findings include:

- There were 12,899,000 crimes against adults living in private households in 2000.

- There was a 12 per cent fall in crimes against people living in private households between 1999 and 2000, the third successive fall recorded by the BCS. Even so, the number of crimes measured by the BCS was still 17 per cent higher than in 1981.
- The proportion of people who were victims of some type of crime once or more during the year fell from 30 per cent in 1999 to 27 per cent in 2000. This is the lowest overall victimisation rate ever measured by the BCS.
- There were falls between 1999 and 2000 in nearly all the offences the BCS measures. Falls were statistically significant for burglary (17 per cent), all vehicle-related theft (11 per cent), other household theft (16 per cent) and violent crime (19 per cent).

- The risk of burglary in rural areas (1.9 per cent) is well below the national average. Between 1995 and 2000 the chance of being burgled in rural areas has declined and continues to be a little around half that for non-rural areas.

- The number of violent crimes fell by 19 per cent between 1999 and 2000. The most common violent crime was common assault, with 2.8 per cent of adults being victims in 2000.

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Fire

A bulletin on early estimates of the statistics for fires, casualties and false alarms in 2000 have been released by the Department for Transport, Local Government and the Regions (DTLR). Key findings include:

- The number of non-fatal casualties from fires dropped by 2 per cent to 17,600 in 2000 – the third consecutive annual fall. The total number of deaths from recorded fires also fell to an estimated 600, compared with 663 in 1999.
- There were an estimated 476,100 fires in the UK in 2000 – up 2 per cent on 1999. Malicious/deliberate fires increased to 97,000, a rise of 8 per cent. This rise was mainly due to the 12 per cent increase in deliberate road vehicle fires to 63,700.
- There were falls in both accidental fires and casualties in dwellings. Fires fell by 3 per cent to 56,000; deaths fell to 397 from 413 and non-fatal casualties fell by 4 per cent to 12,100.


Health

The Department of Health (DH) has released various data relating to children looked after by local authorities in England, for the year ending 31 March 2001.

Children looked after

- 58,900 children were looked after in England at 31 March 2001, 1.4 per cent more than a year earlier. This compares with an average annual increase of 4.4 per cent in the previous 3 years.
- 38,400 of these children were looked after in foster placements, 500 more than a year earlier.
- The number of young people leaving care aged 18 or over has risen slightly, while the number leaving at 16 or 17 continues to fall.

Children looked after: by age, at March 2001



- The time spent looked after before being placed for adoption has been declining, to an average of 1 year 8 months in 2000/01. In 2000/01 326 children (11 per cent) had been looked after for 3 years or more before being placed for adoption.

Educational qualifications of care leavers

- It is estimated that 2,400 (37 per cent) of the 6,500 young people leaving care in 2000/01 had obtained 1 or more GCSEs or GNVQs on leaving care, up from 30 per cent in the previous year.
- 300 (5 per cent) left care with at least 5 GCSEs at grade A*-C; up from 4 per cent last year.

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Education

GCSE/GNVQ

The Department for Education and Skills (DfES) published early information on the overall achievements of young people in GCSE/GNVQ examinations in England in 2000/01. Key points included:

- 49.8 per cent of 15 year old pupils achieved 5 or more grades A*-C at GCSE/GNVQ equivalent.
- Girls continue to outperform boys, particularly at the higher grades (A*-C); 55.2 per cent of girls achieved 5 or more grades A*-C or the GNVQ equivalent compared with 44.6 per cent of boys.

Children adopted from care

- 3,067 looked-after children were adopted in England in the year to 31 March 2001, 12 per cent more than in the previous year, and over 40 per cent more than in 1998/99.
- Just over 67 per cent of these children were aged under five. Just over 5 per cent were aged 10 or over, compared with just under 5 per cent in 1999/2000. Until the current year, this proportion had been declining steadily.

Activities and experiences of young people

DfES has released summary findings of the most recent surveys of 17 and 19 year olds from the Youth Cohort Study carried out in autumn 2000 and winter 2000/01 respectively. Key points included:

- Nearly two-thirds of 17 year olds are in full time education, around one in ten are in government supported training and one in seven are in full time employment.
- Women are more likely than men to be in full time education at 17 (68 per cent compared with 61 per cent). Men are more likely than women to be in government supported training or in a full time job.
- More than three quarters (77 per cent) of 17 year olds said they were studying for a qualification. Nearly two-fifths (38 per cent) said they were studying for GCE A/AS level.
- Just over two fifths of 19 year olds were in full time education. A further third were in full time jobs and one in 10 were in government supported training.
- Full time education is more prevalent among respondents who had achieved more than 8 GCSE grades A*-C at year 11 (80 per cent) and those with parents from managerial and professional occupations (65 per cent) than other respondents.
- Seven out of 10 of all respondents were in some form of education or training at 19 and more than nine in 10 were in some form of education, training or employment. Eight per cent were not in any form of education, training or employment

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Transport

The DTLR has published *Transport Statistics, Great Britain 2001*. Key findings include:

- The average British resident now travels over 6,800 miles a year, an increase of 6 per cent since 1990.
- Car (including van and lorry) travel has continued to grow, and now accounts for 81 per cent of total annual mileage. However, the largest growth over the period has been travel by taxi/minicab (up 47 per cent).
- The number of vehicles taxed for use on Britain's roads had reached 28.9 million by the end of 2000, of which over 24 million were motorcars.
- The number of people holding full driving licences has continued to increase to 71 per cent of the population aged 17 and over in 1998/00. Overall, 82 per cent of men hold a driving licence. Licence holding among women increased from 49 per cent in 1989/91 to 60 per cent in 1998/00.
- 158 billion tonne-kilometres of goods were moved by road in 2000, an increase of 1 per cent since 1999.
- Traffic on roads rose by 0.4 per cent between 1999 and 2000.
- The number of people killed or seriously injured on the roads fell again in 2000, to a level 37 per cent below that in 1990.
- Passenger kilometres on national railways increased by 2 per cent from 38.5 billion in 1999/2000 to 39.2 billion in 2000/01.
- There were 4.3 billion passenger journeys on local bus services in 1999/00, the most recent year for which complete survey data are available. This level has remained fairly stable in recent years following a long term decline.

Note: The purpose and methodology of the Tax and Price Index were described in an article in the August 1979 issue of *Economic Trends*. The purpose is to produce a single index which measures changes in both direct taxes (including national insurance contributions) and in retail prices for a representative cross-section of taxpayers. Thus, while the Retail Prices Index may be used to measure changes in the purchasing power of after-tax

income (and of the income of non-taxpayers) the Tax and Price Index takes account of the fact that taxpayers will have more or less to spend according to changes in direct taxation. The index measures the change in gross taxable income which would maintain their after-tax income in real terms.
