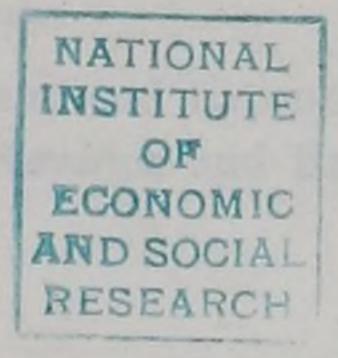

TABLE IX.—PROPOSED CHANGES IN TAXATION

INLAND REVENUE

INCOME TAX

It is proposed to exempt unemployment, sickness and maternity benefits and to provide that relief shall not be allowed in respect of the corresponding part of the National Insurance Contribution.

INCOME TAX AND PROFITS TAX

It is proposed to increase the Initial Allowance in respect of machinery or plant purchased on or after 6th April, 1949, from 20 per cent. to 40 per cent.

It is proposed to institute a system of depletion allowances for United Kingdom mining concerns in respect of capital expenditure on rights to work overseas mineral deposits including oil deposits.

SUR-TAX AND PROFITS TAX

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It is proposed to allow Lloyds Underwriters to deduct for Sur-tax purposes certain sums paid under approved Schemes to Trust Funds to meet future losses and to charge those who join such Schemes to Profits Tax.

DEATH DUTIES

It is proposed to consolidate the existing Estate Duty, Legacy Duty and Succession Duty into a single Duty by abolishing the Legacy and Succession Duties and compensating the Exchequer by an increase in the rates of the Estate Duty.

It is also proposed to make a further increase in the Estate Duty scale to produce an additional £20 millions of new revenue.

Tables showing the present rates of Estate Duty, Legacy Duty and Succession Duty and the proposed new Estate Duty scale appear on page 23.

It is proposed to substitute for the existing relief in respect of the agricultural value of agricultural property a new relief in the form of an abatement of 45 per cent. of the duty chargeable.

It is proposed to raise the exemption limit for out and out gifts inter vivos from £100 to £500.

It is proposed that these changes shall take effect in the case of deaths after the passing of the Finance Bill.

INLAND REVENUE—continued

LAND TAX

It is proposed that Land Tax shall be redeemed compulsorily when property charged changes hands on or after 1st April, 1950.

Where the charge is less than 10s., it is proposed to abolish the tax with effect from the current year.

Where property charged changes hands on death but forms part of an estate below the Estate Duty exemption limit of £2,000, it is proposed to remit the redemption money.

STAMP DUTIES

It is proposed to abolish various stamp duties which have become obsolete or archaic, and a number of others which are imposed on certain legal and commercial documents where the yield of duty is small. These repeals will operate as from the date when the Finance Bill becomes law.

It is proposed to abolish the stamp duty on bonus issues of securities made after the date of the Budget Statement.

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CUSTOMS AND EXCISE

CUSTOMS

Tea.—It is proposed to repeal the duty of 6d. a lb. on Empire tea, and to reduce the duty of 8d. a lb. on non-Empire tea to 2d. a lb., from 7th April, 1949.

Beer.—It is proposed to reduce the Customs duties on imported beer (other than black beer, &c.), by £1 1s. per barrel of 36 gallons, irrespective of the gravity, from 7th April, 1949.

Wines.—It is proposed to reduce the Customs duties on still light wines, imported otherwise than in bottle, by 12s. a gallon. This change will apply, from 7th April, 1949, to wines not exceeding a strength of 27 degrees proof spirit in the case of Empire products, and not exceeding 25 degrees in the case of non-Empire products.

Sugar, &c.—It is proposed to reduce the Customs duties on imported sugar, molasses and glucose, from 5 p.m. on 6th April, 1949. The proposed duties, compared with the existing duties, are given in the following table:—

Beer.—It is proposed to reduce the Excise duty on beer (other than black beer, &c.) by £1 1s. per barrel of 36 gallons, irrespective of the gravity, from 7th April, 1949.

Sweets (British wines, &c.).—It is proposed to reduce the Excise duty on certain sweets (British wines, &c.) by 12s. a gallon. The reduction will apply, from 7th April, 1949, to sweets (other than sparkling sweets) of a strength not exceeding 27 degrees of proof spirit.

Entertainments (Rural Areas).—It is proposed to extend the scope of the exemption from duty at present granted for certain entertainments held in rural areas, including Boroughs, Urban Districts, Rural Parishes, &c., with a population not exceeding 64 to the square mile. Subject to the same conditions, the exemption will apply, from 1st May, 1949, to such areas with a population not exceeding 640 to the square mile.

Betting.—It is proposed to increase the duty on football pool betting, and other forms of pool betting which are at present subject to the rate of 20 per cent., to 30 per cent., for events taking place on or after 9th April, 1949.

Licence Duties.—It is proposed to abolish the duties on excise licences for appraisers, auctioneers, house agents and dealers in plate, after 5th July, 1949.
