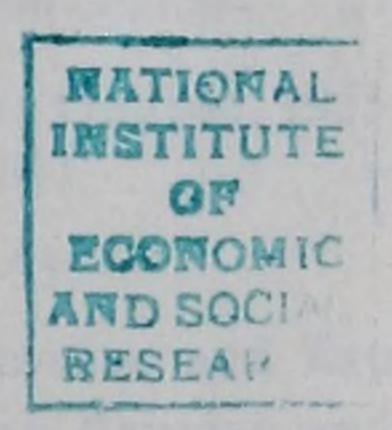

#### INLAND REVENUE

#### INCOME TAX

It is proposed that the provisions of the Income Tax Acts relating to the cessation of one trade and the setting up and commencement of another shall not apply in cases where three-quarters or more of the interest in the trade belonged to the same persons before and after the change.

## INCOME TAX AND PROFITS TAX

It is proposed to make an investment allowance instead of an initial allowance in respect of certain capital expenditure incurred after 6th April, 1954. The investment allowance will apply to expenditure on all types of asset now qualifying for initial allowance, except for second-hand plant and machinery and ordinary motor cars; these excluded items, however, will continue to qualify for initial allowance. The investment allowance will also be made for capital expenditure on agricultural buildings and works, on buildings and plant for scientific research and on plant hitherto dealt with on a "renewals" basis. The new allowance will not be deducted in computing the written down value of the asset for the purpose of annual allowances, balancing allowances or balancing charges. It is proposed to make the investment allowance at the rate of 20 per cent. for plant and machinery, scientific research and mining works and at 10 per cent. for industrial buildings and agricultural buildings and works. In cases, e.g., mining works, where the present initial allowance is at a higher rate than that proposed for the investment allowance, an option will be given to take the initial allowance instead of the investment allowance.

It is proposed to amend the law relating to capital allowances in respect of sales of assets between companies under common control.

#### ESTATE DUTY

It is proposed to increase from £2,000 to £10,000 the limit for non-aggregation of small estates and to take account of settled property derived from the deceased (whether or not settled by him) in determining whether the limit applies.

It is proposed to amend the law relating to policies of assurance which do not form part of the deceased's own estate at death.

It is proposed to give a relief of 45 per cent. of that part of the duty payable which relates to industrial premises and plant and machinery used for the purposes of a trade carried on by the deceased or by a company which he controlled.

It is proposed to make certain modifications of the law relating to the valuation of company shares on the "assets basis".

It is proposed that these changes in estate duty shall take effect in respect of deaths occurring after the passing of the Finance Bill.

#### EXCISE

Entertainments Duty.—It is proposed to reduce the rates of duty on payments for admission to all entertainments at present chargeable with duty. The reduction will apply to entertainments held on or after 30th May, 1954. Under the First Scale (applicable to theatres, music-halls, &c.), and the Second Scale (applicable to sports, racing, &c.), the duty will be reduced by  $\frac{1}{2}d$ . for each admission. Under the Third Scale (applicable to cinemas, &c.), duty will not be chargeable on payments for admission up to and including 9d., in place of 8d. at present, and the rates of duty on higher prices will be reduced as follows:—
