Modelling an Evolving Economy /



We are delighted to be working in partnership with CAGE (University of Warwick), Digital Catapult and Nesta to deliver a workshop on using new methods to measure structural economic change and inform policy on 7 October to be held at the Digital Catapult.

New sources of data and ways to analyse them with machine learning, Artificial Intelligence (AI) and complexity science can help to capture the emergence of new scientific fields, technologies, industries and occupations, improving our ability to measure and model economic change and inform policy, funding and

investment decisions. This includes how to identify and support emerging technologies and industries, level up local economies, make innovation more inclusive and accelerate the transition to a green economy.

This workshop will bring together leading scholars, policymakers and statistical agencies at the forefront of this agenda to discuss the state of the art and what's needed to maximise the impact of these new data sources and methods on our understanding of the economy and the effectiveness of economic and research and innovation policy.

International Perspectives on Management Practices /



This conference organised by Paul Mizen (University of Nottingham), Rebecca Riley (King’s College London) and Tatsuro Senga (Queen Mary University London) will bring together the world authorities on management practices for an in-person audience drawn from UK academics, government departments, private consulting practices, charitable bodies and think tanks. The event will be live streamed to an international audience.

The conference will provide an overview of the [Management and Organizational Practices Survey \(MOPS\)](#), the results of this survey in three continents (Europe, Asia, North America), and a keynote presentation of ‘The Natural Law of Management’ by Daniela Scur (Dyson School, Cornell University). The conference will close with a policy panel chaired by John Van Reenen (LSE).

ESCoE Conference on Economic Measurement 2022 /

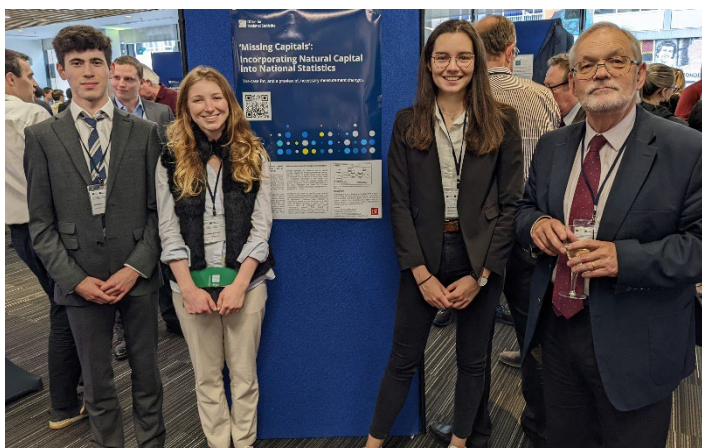
